James III : - The True Mirror

The True Mirror is the last of a trilogy of plays called The James Plays about the first three King Jameses of Scotland. The last was James VI, son of Mary Queen of Scots, who became King James I of England. Although few people are familiar with this period of Scotland's history Rona Munro's robust scripts, first played by the National Theatre of Scotland during the 2014 Edinburgh Festival, are exciting and accessible being written in modern Scots speech.

The play is set mostly in Stirling and Edinburgh Castles.

James III : - The True Mirror

The Work in Progress...

When I decided to go for an extra long rehearsal period for this production it was not just because of the complex nature of the play's structure which includes a cast of 20+, choreography, original music, fight, multiple locations and scenes, and all the complications of staging all of this in our compact Studio premises, it was also because I wanted to avoid the stress placed on both the production team and cast in the event of the inevitable unseen hitches we would no doubt encounter on the journey 'from page to stage'. We have now completed our first month of rehearsals with some parts being 'read in' more frequently than by the actor cast; two cases of Covid (no doubt the calm before the storm); a last minute hunt for a Musical Director and actors for a couple of uncast parts and the dilemma of staging a play set in two Scottish castles without it stretching out to a four hour marathon due to interminable scene changes..

Miraculously quite a few of these problems have been overcome as we start our second month undaunted by the prospect of even more cast absences.

Much of this is due to the support I've had from Angela Markham (assistant director and master reader-in of all parts) and Eszter Vass (super efficient production manager and mother of a prince). And a special thanks to the cast for their good-natured acceptance of last minute changes in the rehearsal schedule when the unexpected or unplanned for happened.

Last week, our 'comedy choir' met our new-to-us and untried Musical Director for the first time, making



up in enthusiasm for what (some) may lack in vocal expertise. Last Sunday Jenny Foster started to put the whole cast through their paces in a modern/medieval Scottish dance, set to medieval/modern music!

Chrissy and I have had a lot of fun discussing inauthentic and bizarre costumes made or adapted from inauthentic and bizarre recycled materials and fabrics to try to match my vision for this theatrical, witty and above all totally accessible portrayal of an uncharted period of Scottish history.

By the end of August I hope we'll be ready for a complete change of pace in rehearsal practice and commit-

ment as we knuckle down in September and October to serious work having mastered the superfluous side issues and miraculously become word perfect in the process!

One (evil) cast member has set himself the challenge of provoking me into losing my temper. Let's hope this relaxed soft start approach has made this less likely - but no guarantees!

We can treat each week as a workshop where we can support each other, take notes, create mood boards and look at the text for clues as to how to costume the characters in the play.

Earthquakes has a large cast so it gives us all an ideal opportunity to learn a great deal from this experience.

I'm pleased to say that **Jacqs Graham** and **Fran Lewis** have both said they are willing to be part of this.

MEMBERSHIP SUBSCRIPTIONS 2022/23

Financially, it's been a tough couple of years for many of us. Suspending Kelvin subscriptions for current members over the last couple of years has no doubt helped. But this isn't a long-term solution and at some point we have to look at what we ask people to pay to become a member of this club.

As of 1st August, subscriptions for 2022/23 are due. However this year, following the recent membership survey, we've decided to take a new approach. While our recommended subscription fee will remain the same (£40), we will also be offering a new pay-what-you -can-afford policy, with a £10 minimum, to help those of us struggling during the current cost of living crisis. Whilst our members told us that the cost of Kelvin Players' membership compares favourably with memberships of similar organisations, we need to remember that not all of us are in the same position, and it's unfair to restrict some people from the club because their spending potential has been affected by fuel price increases and inflation hikes. And £40 is not the maximum fee – if you feel able to give a little more to the running of the club, then your contributions will be welcomed and very much appreciated.

Doing this is right for several reasons:

Earlier this year, the executive group agreed that focusing on retaining our membership was our main priority. We don't want to lose people who are valuable members and who have contributed lots over the years. It's also worth bearing in mind that our current subscriptions are quite prohibitive for many potential new members from some of the groups we're particularly keen to encourage to join. Two years ago we highlighted that we are largely a middle-class group, and removing the fixed £40 fee helps to make us a more equitable club for those for whom £40 is too big an expense. We want more people from a wider variety of backgrounds, and reducing this burden is one way to help.

Therefore the recommended membership fee for 2022/23 will remain £40 for full membership. However, if this is too much for you right now, you can pay as little as £10 to retain your membership.

Come the AGM in September, we're also planning to introduce a new way to stay in touch with the club and feel a part of what we're doing, without committing to a full membership. The Kelvin Players community is much wider and goes much further than the 100 or so people who usually appear in or backstage at our shows, and we want to reflect that.

In the meantime, please don't forget – payments are DUE NOW and the DEADLINE for subscription renewals is the AGM (Sunday 25th September). A payment form with club bank details follows, or you can pay by cash or cheque (at the latest) at the start of the AGM. Many thanks,

Making a Stand - Mat's Blog

In the woods behind my house there is a set of wooden steps that run down to the river. These are the typical sort of wooden steps that you find outdoors usually in woodlands, with planks embedded lengthwise and side-on in the slope, wooden stakes either side holding them in, and the earth pilled in behind it. Alongside the steps, running from top to bottom are additional runners to keep the compacted earth in place. They're a wonderful, simple creation to stop you slipping down the hill when the earth becomes a mudbath in winter.

Last year, while out walking with the dog, I noticed one of the side runners had broken and become dislodged. I carried on walking, thinking little more about it. I didn't know how to fix it or who to tell, and figured it was probably someone else's job.

A few weeks later, after countless more people had walked up and down the steps, I discovered that, with no runner holding it in place, one of the lengthwise planks had also become dislodged. Still not knowing what to do, I ignored that, too.

With no plank to hold it up, the earth simply collapsed and ran down the hill, putting pressure on the steps below. Over the next few weeks, as many more people continued to walk up and down the steps, further planks and runners became dislodged, until the point now where it's close to simply being a slope again.

All that hard work that someone put into building those steps to provide a safe, secure method of allowing others to go up and down that hill had disappeared. It could of course, be built again – but at a much bigger cost, and with a lot of extra hard work. It wasn't my fault the first step came out, I thought. But if only, I thought, I had spoken up and told someone when that first runner came free, it could have been put back in place quickly, and the whole set of steps kept together. I could have stopped that from happening. I could have prevented further damage if I'd told someone earlier.

Later this year, the club will be implementing a new, more robust inclusivity policy with the aim of providing more support to those who experience harassment, abuse and inequality.

The onus will be placed on every single one of us to be more considerate of the words we use and the actions we take. It's no longer enough to simply say, 'well, that's who I am.' They are your words and deeds, and they have consequences.

And responsibility will also be placed on each of us to take action where we see instances of discrimination or harassment. If you witness any form of abuse or sexual harassment, for example, please speak up and tell someone. The person on the receiving end may not feel as comfortable or as able to do so. We are a diverse, inclusive family and we want to keep it that way.

If you see a broken step, it's up to you to do something about it before it's too late. Thanks.

Lis Miller's Memorial Get-Together, Sunday July 3rd 2022

Reflections by Richard Jones.....

A trip down to Kilmington Village Hall in deepest Devon, not too far from Lyme Regis to attend Lis's Memorial Get -Together on a lovely, but hot, summer's day. This was a pilgrimage that I knew I had to make to offer my last homage to a Kelvin member who played such a large part not only in my personal Kelvin career but also in the fortunes of Kelvin in the 1970s, 1980s, and early 1990s. This period was when she, as the 'she who must be obeyed' (meant affectionately), was a production Stage Manager and Director who so often brought calm to chaos in the hurley-burley of bringing a production to stage.

And that is not just me saying that. In his 'eulogy', Scott Foster said he met Lis in 1974 when he was a schoolboy at Clifton College. During a get-in for a Kelvin show he wandered in to the theatre and asked who he should talk to, in order to help, and was taken over to Lis. A perhaps unlikely friendship that spanned 47 years ensued with Lis undoubtedly shaping Scott's life, and career, in that he went on to study Stage and Theatre Management and had a successful professional career which Lis followed with great joy.

And he wasn't the only one. Neil Constable also a fellow pupil, is now Chief Executive at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre. He told Scott that she had a similar influence on his life, describing Lis as the earliest professional/amateur stage manager he had ever met. I always think that an 'enjoyable' funeral/memorial is one where you leave ending up knowing considerably more about the deceased. And so it was with Lis! During the event, I was asked to speak on behalf of Kelvin. Unprepared as I was, the words flowed easily, and I passed on the thoughts of many Kelvinites who sent their fond memories but were unable to travel or make the journey. Perhaps inevitably a toast was raised in the drinking of a dram of malt in Lis's memory.

It was a pleasure too to meet up with Vickie Lennard who knew Lis from her Kelvin days. She had stopped over, returning from a holiday on a Thunderbird Triumph motor cycle in Lyme Regis and looked tanned and happy following the not so recent deaths of her sister Jacquie and her husband whom she called 'Nige', saying that she and her new partner 'Barry the Bike' (owner and rider of the Triumph) often laugh in reminiscing about the good times she had with 'Nige'.

An exhausting day, but one I am so glad I made in the company of Denise (and of course, 'Badger' the dog)......

Director's Postcript

I feel very lucky to have had the opportunity to direct at the Tobacco Factory and the experience did not disappoint. It was tricky to take something from Kelvin and put it into a new location but on the whole I felt we got this right.

Out of our 14 strong cast, 5 were appearing in their first Kelvin production with another making a comeback after 12 years away.

A special mention needs to go to Elly who was outstanding as Jane. She nailed that part from her first audition. I could not believe how good she was and she never wavered from this level at any point in rehearsal,

But I was really blessed with a fantastic cast right the way through, and rehearsals, although a test at times given the conditions of the text, were on the whole delightful. Lots of laughs in the early stages and lots of hard work to pull it all together at the end.

We had a greater number of backstage help than cast in this epic production and for me, every element carried equal weighting alongside the cast in creating an overall effect. Lighting, sound and music, set, props and costume had a huge bearing on the overall look and feel of the show.

We were extremely lucky with Covid. Only one cast member came down with it in rehearsals and sad as we were to have Chrissy go down with Covid in the last week of rehearsals, it was a miracle no cast member was taken ill during the run given the high numbers at that time.

I would also like to mention Mamadou, who was a fabulous addition (although not cheap!) to the show. Initially, I had only wanted the drums to complement the constant stage presence of Bertha (brilliantly played by Fran Lewis, I barely directed her, she was alert to every opportunity her role presented) but Mamadou insisted on using the Kora to counterpoint the aggression of the drums.



Bronwen's thought provoking yet simple set design gave me an open stage to play with and the lighting complemented it beautifully particularly during the fires, highlighted in the picture attached at the top of this article. Neil really has incredible vision for what can be achievable with lighting.

Chrissy's meticulous attention to detail can never be underestimated with the brilliant, beautiful and versatile costume choices (Giving me the opportunity to get Jane changed in and out of her wedding dress on stage) and Angela's help in the week with costume was invaluable. Joanne was a calm steady hand that I needed as production manager when it all felt like it was just far too much to manage.

Chris was an excellent DSM, attending almost all rehearsals and having to adjust his sound plans to accommodate and then instruct the musician. A great baptism of fire for Danny on lighting!

Thanks to Jonny, Andy and Susan for construction and lighting. Peter and Jess for help on painting. Avanti and Mayble on hair. Sharon and Caroline on props and SM. Sharon is always such a calm organised presence backstage and Caroline is so inventive with her prop finds!

I would also like to give an extra thanks to Mike, Alex, Joe and Jolyon for sorting all those scene changes. The bed was particularly cumbersome piece of furniture that was swiftly dealt with. Mike Jessup thanks for all those rehearsal shots!

Although I'm pretty sure we didn't make any money on this show, I hope the chance to perform at one of Bristol's premier theatres has opened up the club to a new group of theatre goers.
