



I have listed the dates below when RRs will be performed. If you're interested in acting, just make sure you have **5th February 2022** in your diary - this is the evening to come along to, as you're bound to get a part in something if you turn up.

If you really absolutely can't make it to this launch evening but you'd still like to be cast in something, please contact me a-s-a-p, making sure you state which of the belowmentioned 4 dates you can and can't commit to. I will then put your name on the casting reserve list, which we will turn to for any parts not filled by attendees on the night - which means of course that this is no guarantee at all of casting, but at least it means you'll be in with a chance.

RRs in a nutshell are script-in-hand, play-in-a-day style presentations - so if you fancy a bit of low-stakes but high-buzz acting, this launch is the key event to come along to. 

## Jane Eyre by Polly Teale

# **Directed by Simon Shorrock Produced by Joanne Brooks**

at The Tobacco Factory Theatre:

28 June to 02 July 2022 @ 7:30



This version of Jane Eyre from Polly Teale presents a Jane who is wrestling with the confinements of a Victorian society. She is strong willed girl of only 18 years of age when she leaves for Thornfield to work as a governess in the home of Rochester. Most of the play centres around the developing relationship between Jane and Rochester who is 20+ years her senior. Rochester hides his first wife Bertha in his attic and when Jane discovers of her existence she fleas from Thornfield. She ends up at the house of St John Rivers, a missionary who takes Jane in to his home with the aid of his 2 sisters. When St John decides he wants to marry Jane, Jane is uninterested in a passionless marriage as the wife of a missionary and hurries back to Thornfield to discover a dishevelled Rochester, blinded and damaged by a fire started by Bertha. She vows to marry Rochester following Bertha's death in the fire.

The play presents an interesting twist in her relationship with Bertha, Rochester's first wife, who is locked in his attic, hidden away from Jane. Right from the start Jane and Bertha are intertwined, physically at points. Bertha, despite her apparent madness, represents everything that Jane wants to be. She has a freedom of expression ill afforded to a girl of her age in Victorian England. There is a kind of yin and yang relationship between them throughout the play where we see Bertha physically responding to Jane's trials and tribulations. Bertha will be visible on stage at all times in the 'attic'. As a result of this, the character of Bertha will be a very physical role and her relationship with jane will be key. The script as it is call for an amount of multi-rolling and is designed for 8 actors. I will be looking for a troupe of around 12. I am looking at being age fluid, by using an actor slightly older than Jane's given age but with a suitable gap between her and Rochester.

Bertha (F 30+)
Rochester (M 40+)
Mrs Fairfax (F 50+)
Adele (playing 9 years of age)
St John (20's-30's)

In the troupe there will be 6 more actors (4 female and 2 male) playing a variety of roles and ages.

March 29<sup>th</sup> Auditions (7pm) March 31<sup>st</sup> Auditions (7pm) April 3<sup>rd</sup> Call Backs (6pm)

Rehearsals start on Tuesday April 26<sup>th</sup> and are on Tuesday (7-9), Thursday(7-9) and Sundays (6-9) If you are interested in helping out with a backstage role please get in touch with Joanne. Please also come to the launch and read through as we will want to recruit a team as well as a cast.

#### James 111: - The True Mirror

# By Rona Munro Directed by Mary McCallum October 25 - 29 2022

October seems a long way off and there are many exciting activities planned for Kelvin Members before then but I for one am starting to plan for this exciting and innovative production right now.

*The True Mirror* is the last of a trilogy of plays called The James Plays about the first three King Jameses of Scotland. The last one was James VI, son of Mary Queen of Scots, who became King James I of England.

Although few people familiar with this period of Scotland's history Rona Munro's robust scripts, first played by the National Theatre of Scotland during the 2014 Edinburgh Festival, are exciting and accessible being written in modern Scots speech.

But more of the Performance aspect later. What I want to do now is promote interest in the Creative and Production aspects of the play. Many people wait till after the play is cast before showing interest in these other roles but this time there is no need! In most cases one role does not rule out another, in fact I intend to actively encourage it.

#### THE CREATIVES

The play is set mostly in Stirling and Edinburgh Castles with 5 or 6 distinct areas such as 'The Great Hall' and 'The Garden' and demands a **scenic design** which depicts these two magnificent Scottish castles while allowing the various scenes to flow one into the other with a minimum of 'scene setting'.

**Lighting** will depict the many aspects of the climate while also portraying a bloody battle with the appropriate **sounds**.

There is **music**, from a wild dance to a simple song but also with a small choir who comically follow the King around and burst into song.

Dance - could you choreograph an exciting dance in the great Hall of the castle?

**Costumes** will be unconventional and not tied to the few pictures of mostly rich people that survive from the time so dig out those old leather trousers or jerkins and be prepared to see them transformed.

**The Creative Team** will not be barred from being part of the performance team, indeed I hope that at least the choir leader and dance leader will very much wish to take part as well as doing their creative thing!

Creatives:- Assistant Director, Set Designer, Costume Designer, Musical Director, Choreographer, Lighting Designer, Sound Designer

#### THE PRODUCTION TEAM

Is your skill in making things happen either in constructing things, gathering stuff, organising paperwork, operating boards, liaising with the everyone else and knowing what each one is responsible for? If so YOUR CLUB NEEDS YOU and more specifically, I NEED YOU!

As with the Creatives, being productive need not bar you from performance as well.

Production Team:- Production Manager, Stage Manager, Construction Manager, DSM/ASM

So if you think you could help with any role at all please get in touch. At this stage I especially want to hear from potential scenic designers so that we can start talking asap but please get in touch, whatever your interest.

Someone made a remark recently that in the professional theatre everyone has their own job to do and doesn't encroach on other people's territory. Well aren't we lucky to be able to dabble our toes in various areas of interest and learn about all aspects of putting on a production.

This show needs a large cast and large production and creative teams. Come along and join the fun. More later.

## Lest We Forget: Bill West & David Higson

19th November saw the official opening of the re-furbished bar. Whilst the twenty-five or so of us present were happy to eat and drink our way through this celebration, it should not be forgotten that the work was only possible through firstly the extraordinary hard work of **Bill West** who for over twenty years raised literally thousands of pounds whilst hosting a deal of conviviality for Kelvin as Bar Manager. A brass plaque dedicating a corner of the bar, *Bill's Corner*, is an everlasting memorial of this achievement! Also commemorated is a photo of **David Higson** in the entrance foyer, a lovely image that does justice to this Kelvin member who until his death in 2017 (through Motor Neurone Disease) played such an important part in the life and times of the Club. He joined Kelvin in 1953 and provided all who knew him with some lovely memories of the wide variety of eccentrics he played on the Kelvin stage and in any gathering, where he was always first to the bar. An evening spent with him and his older brother John, also a Kelvin member, was always an occasion of great joy!

The bar refurbishment happened thanks to David Higson's Legacy Inheritance and he would have been delighted that the new bar area is to be called *Higson's* 

#### **Images of the Kelvin Bar** (see below)

- (2) How the kitchen looked in 1986 when Kelvin bought the studios (note how the two rooms comprising the bar and Committee room have not yet been knocked in to one.

- (4) The old Committee room (with an even, inherited, older gas fire)

Note: Considerable amounts of work to the studio were carried out at no labour cost by Kelvin members. Further editions of *The Jester* will feature 'before' and 'after' images of other parts of the studio.

## FROM THE KEYBOARD OF THE CHAIR'S DESK!



#### Hello everyone,

**My Blog**: Now that a little time has passed and we've got our first production out of the way, I thought it might be time to set out some of my thoughts for the club.

In essence, I want pretty much the same things you all want: I want us to produce a variety of great shows; offer lots of great parts; draw big audiences; and win lots of awards. I want our club to be – and to be seen to be – the best theatre company in Bristol. Easy, eh?

To achieve all of that, we have to push ourselves, and each other to do our best - to challenge ourselves to try new things. Over the last decade, we've settled into a routine of 5 main stage productions and 8 nights of rehearsed readings each year, never straying far from that format. After almost two years of near-inactivity, now is the perfect time to reassess that format and to investigate new formats and initiatives, and I know that this is something Nicky is keen to investigate.

However we do that, one thing remains essential: we provide all our members with the opportunity to make the most of their membership. People are desperate to get out of the house and get back to the theatre, so let's give them something in which they can be involved, whether that's on-stage or off. I'm really pleased that Josh has agreed to take on the role of Membership Development, and both Nicky and I will be working with Josh to expand the training and development opportunities we offer. Not least because it's such a great way of bringing new people into the club.

This is your club, and we want your input as much as anyone else's. If you see a job that you think needs doing, don't wait to be asked - offer your help. I have a terrible habit of assuming everyone knows what my skills are. But the only person who actually knows that is me. If you're interested in something, put yourself forward. We value your input, and you won't be turned away.

As well as producing great theatre and expanding the membership offer, I'm also keen for us to look outside the club much more. At times we can be quite insular, and many of the responses to last year's survey highlighted the need for us to be more welcoming, inclusive, and to listen to different voices. Others said they'd like to see us working with other groups, doing things like community theatre. I'm really keen for us to investigate these opportunities and to look at ways we can develop. Some people are afraid of words like diversity. They fear that what it really means is that they'll be moved out to create room for other people. The club does need to welcome new faces for us to survive and to become much more representative of the city of Bristol – but this should not be at the expense of any of the wonderful, talented members we currently have. Indeed, I want to grow our community. To do that, we all need to be much more inclusive of others and to be proactive in giving others a chance.

I've always seen Kelvin Players as an artistic hub — a theatre company that provides a platform for people of all backgrounds from across the whole city of Bristol to get involved in a wealth of opportunities. The large membership, strong structure, and superb studio facilities and forward-looking outlook allows this. Over the next few years, I want us to expand that platform, to provide more opportunities, and to develop a more inclusive, welcoming and 'can do' culture. I'd love to hear your thoughts on how we should progress, and what we should spend our time and efforts doing, over the next few years.
