





Cyrano de Bergerac – wants to woo Roxane....

Roxane (his heart's desire! they were childhood playmates).

Christian de Neuvillette - Not worldly-wise or eloquent but full of bravado and energy.

Count Antoine De Guiche – Lustful, manipulative, vengeful, full of his own importance. He wants to marry Roxane but is already married (to Cardinal Richelieu's niece), so tries to have Roxane married to Viscount de Valvert so that he can have 'access' to her at any time he wants.

Ragueneau – Baker and patron of all the poets who frequent his shop (but not a poet himself). If they say they're a poet, he feeds them for free. Great friend and supporter of Cyrano. Married to Lise, he's a bit of a soft touch. **Henri le Bret** – similar to Cyrano. Great friend & Cyrano's posthumous biographer.

Nuns — and assorted other players....

Cyrano de Bergerac is a play written in 1897 by Edmond Rostand. Although there was a real Cyrano de Bergerac, the play is a fictionalisation following the broad outlines of his life.

Savinien de Cyrano de Bergerac - duellist, playwright, poet and novelist - was born in in Paris (not Gascony) in March 1619 and died in 1655, aged 36. He was injured by a sword cut to the neck at Arras and never fully recovered. The featured Siege of Arras took place in 1640.

Swordsman, Philosopher, Poet, Raconteur Cyrano de Bergerac is all these things, but none of them makes him happy. What he desires above all, is the love of the beautiful Roxane. But his problem is as plain as the nose on his face. Surely, he is too ugly ever to be loved?

Salvation of a kind arrives in the form of the handsome yet tongue-tied Christian de Neuvillette - might Cyrano's eloquence and Christian's beauty together, win Roxane? Yet duelling, powerful rivals, and a war against Spain, all fall into Cyrano's path to keep him from Roxane.

The time at opening of the play is 1655 (with the majority of the play in 'flash-back' to 1639/40) and then closing again in the 'present', 1655. This is the time of the three musketeers.

Henri le Bret wrote a biography after Cyrano's death, confirming his country childhood, his military engagements and the injuries he sustained, his prowess as a swordsman and the circumstances of his death. Rostand suggests that Cyrano was killed by a log being dropped on his head (possibly by or at the behest of le Comte de Guiche).





We remember: JUNE WILSON

Not too many current Kelvin members will remember June Wilson whose death was reported in last October/November's edition of The Jester. June had been a member of Kelvin since1949 and died last August aged 96. The intervening years had seen June playing a great many roles for Kelvin as well as directing and playing in some professional productions.

Whilst today's collective Kelvin members might struggle to remember her despite her maintaining a lively interest in all Kelvin was doing right up to the end, she certainly remembered Kelvin, as in her will she left the sum of £1,000 to the club, to be used to enhance the technical aspects of the club's theatrical endeavours.

For this and all that June contributed to Kelvin she is remembered very fondly.

Butterworth's brilliant play. It has been one of the most rewarding theatrical experiences I have ever had.

I found everything from pre-production planning and launching, auditioning, casting and rehearsal, right through to production to be an absolute pleasure.

I was blessed with a cast whose happy energy, commitment and bravery showed in every performance. Our journey was a highly creative one and I couldn't be more proud of the skill and willingness to play that Rosie, Sam and Reg offered up, at every rehearsal, right from the start.

Bronwen's set design was, for me, a wonderful representation of the world of our play and beautifully fulfilled the challenging, black-box brief. Pete's sound, (which was mostly made of up of his own original compositions), and Neil's lighting and projection elements all worked to achieved a perfect atmosphere within which our play came to life.

Thank you to those of you who came to see the production and took the time to write comments on our 'blackboard', or sent kind messages afterwards on social media. Some of the feedback we received was amazing and a real boost to the whole team. You called the show: "Compelling...brilliant", "Awe inspiring" and you said: "We were enthralled", "The acting was brilliant".

These comments, along with the Rosebowl adjudication, which was incredibly positive, reinforce not only the strength of our production but also the ability that Kelvin has to stage high-quality, challenging, contemporary theatre.

I am incredibly proud to be a part of the club...and if the APC let me loose on another play, I'll gladly do it all again!

The Flint Street Nativity by Tim Firth

Just thought I would give all members a heads up about the December production – a two week run as per the dates above.

I have now confirmed dates of Launch night, Read-through, auditions and rehearsal period. As I am away for the first two weeks in September I would like to get the Launch night and Auditions out of the way so we can get cracking for a couple of rehearsals prior to Cyrano and then immediately after that production finishes.

So a little bit about the play

There's more to Flint Street than at first appears. It is a comedy, but underneath there is a lot of pathos, and it calls for some very subtle acting. The play requires each actor to take two parts — themselves as seven-year-olds performing their school's nativity, then as their parents who have just watched them perform.

It focuses on a Mrs Horrock's class of children aged seven and eight, and their involvement in a sole performance of the school nativity play. It follows the youngsters from the pre-performance classroom preparations through to the final stage performance where calamity and chaos ensue.

Little Theatre Guild Report

Background to the Little Theatre Guild

As many of the committee may not be aware of what the Little Theatre Guild (LTG) is and does I have started with a brief background. The LTG is the umbrella organisation to co-ordinate the development of independent amateur theatres across the UK and beyond. It is a vibrant community of over 100 member theatres which has been in existence since 1946. Membership of the LTG is open to amateur theatres that own or lease the theatres in which their productions are staged. Networking opportunities through regional and national conferences together with regular newsletters ensure strong communication on a host of topics.

The LTG is split into three geographical regions, Northern, Central and Southern Region. The current Patron is Sir Kenneth Branagh who replaced Sir Ian McKellen in 2016.

Kelvin Players has been a member organisation since 1993 and are in the Southern Region. Kelvin Players has hosted both Regional and National events over the years.

What has the LTG done for us?

In recent years the Guild has concentrated on administrative matters, holding a sequence of meetings on VAT and recently on Health & Safety, at various theatres across the country, using expert speakers and tutors. In addition the Guild has in recent years produced guidance papers on Children in the Theatre, Copyright Music, Child Protection, the Licensing Act 2003, and Employment Law changes.

It produces Grey Papers – effectively advice and guidance on a variety of subjects from those mentioned above to Fire Safety (Paper 12) for set designers, a reissue of Use of Copyright Music - PRS and PPL (Paper 7) and general Copyright Problems (Paper 17).

The reissue of Paper 7 arose because of questions by me and another theatre about the changes that would be made when PRS and PPL joined to form a single body. The Grey Paper gives a view from the LTG.

The LTG also produces a Year Book which records in full detail the activities of each member theatre – an invaluable source of information about plays presented and box-office percentages achieved. The LTG uses the information it gathers to promote amateur theatre in representations to Parliament and to the national press. You will find copies on the window ledge on the way to the Morris Room.

There you will also find copies of the newsletters which come out each quarter with interesting information about the amateur theatre world. Earlier this year Neil Bonnett responded to an advert in a newsletter for lighting being sold by Formby Little Theatre at a knockdown price. I read the newsletters and bring items of interest to the Chair.

The LTG has also been involved with academics working on the social and human impact of amateur theatre in the UK and Ireland. One such book, The Ecologies of Amateur Theatre, was launched the the last Annual Conference, following which I sent copies of Richard Jones' story of Kelvin Players to one of the authors based at Exeter University. The first draft of another book about the social good of amateur dramatics was delivered by Jenny Landreth. It is due to be published next year (2020).

The next Southern Conference will take place in Hastings during the weekend of 20th - 22nd September. I will not be able to attend. If any Committee Member is able to attend and wishes to do so, please contact me for details and information.
